A Bill to Block Advanced Creative AI Websites and Apps

1 **BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:**

2 **SECTION 1.** All domestic internet service providers (ISPs) are directed to block websites
3 and apps that utilize artificial intelligence to enable users to produce art, writing, and other
4 creative works based on original prompts.

5 **SECTION 2.** The National Telecommunications and Information Administration (NTIA) shall
6 be entrusted with determining and publicizing which websites meet this criteria and must
7 be blocked, as well as with overseeing implementation of this legislation generally.

8 **SECTION 3.** Any ISPs found to be in violation of this legislation shall be fined a minimum of
9 \$5,000 and a maximum of \$50,000 per infraction. Repeated violations (more than five in a
10 year) shall result in the revocation of that ISP's license to provide internet services.

11 **SECTION 4.** This legislation shall take effect on January 1, 2024.

12 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Establish Mandatory National Service

1 **BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:**

2 **SECTION 1.** Each U.S. Citizen born after January 1, 2006, must complete at least two
3 years of public service by the time of their 30th birthday.

4 **SECTION 2.** This requirement may be satisfied through two full years of service in one of
5 the following: the Armed Forces (including the National Guard), the Peace Corps,
6 AmeriCorps, or the National Health Service Corps.

7 **SECTION 3.** The penalties for failing to meet this requirement shall be identical to those that
8 accompany failure to register for the Selective Service when required to do so.

9 **SECTION 4.** This legislation shall be overseen by the Selective Service System.

10 **SECTION 5.** This legislation shall take effect on January 1, 2024.

11 **SECTION 6.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Ban Styrofoam Food Containers

1 **BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:**

2 **SECTION 1.** The use of styrofoam by restaurants and other providers of prepared meals for
3 packaging and/or serving food and/or beverages is hereby banned.

4 **SECTION 2.** Any establishment found to be in violation of this legislation shall be fined \$100
5 for each violation. Should the total amount fined to a single establishment ever exceed
6 \$10,000, that establishment shall lose its license(s) to sell food and/or beverages.

7 **SECTION 3.** This legislation shall be overseen by the Food and Drug Administration.

8 **SECTION 4.** This legislation shall take effect on January 1, 2024.

9 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Close All Foreign Military Bases

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:

2 SECTION 1. Within ten years of the passage of this legislation, all U.S. military bases
3 situated within foreign countries shall be closed, their personnel returned to the U.S., and
4 their land and facilities returned unconditionally to each respective nation.

5 SECTION 2. This legislation shall be overseen by the Department of Defense.

6 SECTION 3. This legislation shall take effect immediately upon passage.

7 SECTION 4. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Resolution to Discourage Social Media Use By Elected Officials

1 **WHEREAS** Politicians at all levels have become over reliant on social media to argue and

2 communicate policy proposals online to niche audiences and platforms; and

3 **WHEREAS** Disruption in the social media space among Twitter, Facebook, TikTok, and

4 other prominent social media platforms has made credibility and trust a matter of

5 public concern; and

6 **WHEREAS** The lack of fact-checking and mediation among nearly all social media

7 platforms are inconsistent with the virtues of open communication with the public; and

8 **WHEREAS** Political figures of all types spend disproportionate time on social media

9 platforms, either by themselves or their designees, time that could be better spent

10 governing and communicating through other channels; and

11 **WHEREAS** Members of this Congress have proposed to ban TikTok from all government

12 phones due to concerns over data privacy; therefore be it

13 **RESOLVED** by the Congress here assembled that all holders of political office (federal,

14 state, and local) remove social media apps from their phones; and be it

15 **FURTHER RESOLVED** that Congressional and other political leaders will vow to

16 discontinue their use of public social media accounts so that public deliberation, policy

17 implementation, and enforcement no longer take place online but are a part of public

18 debate on the floors of their respective legislative bodies only.

A Bill to Ban Tackling in Football and Rugby

1 **BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:**

2 **SECTION 1.** Tackling is hereby prohibited in public elementary, middle, and secondary
3 education sports in football, rugby, and any other activities where tackling is standard
4 practice within the sport. The use of flags as a stand-in for tackling shall remain legal, and
5 public and private at all levels are encouraged to embrace this humane adaptation.

6 **SECTION 2.** Tackling is defined as the intentional use of physical contact and force to arrest
7 another player's movement, bring that player to the ground, and/or compel that player to
8 lose possession of the ball.

9 **SECTION 3.** Any public school found to be allowing tackling sports without penalty shall be
10 fined \$1,000 for each violation.

11 **SECTION 4.** This legislation shall be jointly overseen by the Department of Health and
12 Human Services and the Department of Education.

13 **SECTION 5.** This legislation shall take effect on August 1, 2025.

14 **SECTION 6.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
