

A Resolution to Federalize the Texas National Guard

1	WHEREAS, There is an ongoing migrant crisis at the U.S Mexico border; and
2	WHEREAS, Governor Greg Abbott of Texas is using the Texas National Guard to
3	block physical access to portions of the border by Federal immigration
4	personnel; and
5	WHEREAS, This stand-off between State and Federal personnel risks a constitutional
6	crisis regarding which government is responsible for border control; and
7	WHEREAS, This stand-off between State and Federal personnel endangers the health
8	and safety of both migrants and U.S. citizens; now, therefore, be it
9	RESOLVED, That the Congress here assembled urges President Biden to federalize
10	the Texas National Guard and order it to withdraw from the border so that
11	Federal personnel can resolve the migrant crisis without state interference.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

A Bill to Replace Landlines with VoIP Services

2.	SECTION 1. The United States shall remove landlines beginning in the				
3.	Southern US and then will fund and replace them with VoIP				
4.	services.				
5.	SECTION 2. The following definitions apply:				
6.	A. Landlines shall be defined as telecommunications connections by				
7.	cable laid across land, either on poles or buried underground.				
8.	B. VoIP Services shall be defined as technology that makes voice calls				
9.	using a broadband Internet connection instead of a regular phone				
10.	line.				
11.	C. The Southern US shall be defined as the states of Arizona, New				
12.	Mexico, Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Louisiana, Mississippi,				
13.	Tennessee, Alabama, Georgia, North and South Carolina, and				
14.	Florida.				
15.	SECTION 3. The Federal Communications Commission will oversee the				
16.	enforcement of this legislation.				
17.	A. This legislation will be funded with a 10 cent usage tax on both				
18.	telephone and mobile devices per month.				
19.	B. If this project is not completed by said date the Federal				
20.	Communications will lose 5% of their funding until the legislation is				
21.	completed.				
22.	SECTION 4. This legislation will take effect on April 1, 2024 and must be				
23.	completed by April 1, 2026.				
24.	SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared nul				
25.	and void

A Bill to Advance High-Speed Rail Development to Promote Public Transportation

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT.

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2.	SECTION 1. Additional funding will be allocated to the Department of
3.	Transportation for the development, implementation, and
4.	further necessary research of High-Speed Rail Systems across
5.	the United States.
6.	SECTION 2. The following definitions apply:
7.	A. "High-Speed Rail System" is defined as a rail network capable of
8.	sustained speeds exceeding 150 miles per hour.
9.	B. "Labor shortages" will be defined as a substantial lack of manual
10.	working employees that may halt the construction of the railways
11.	and will be determined at the discretion of the Department of
12.	Transportation.
13.	SECTION 3. The Department of Transportation and the Federal Railroad
14.	Administration shall be responsible for the implementation of
15.	this legislation.
16.	A. An additional \$200 billion of funding will be allocated to the
17.	Department of Transportation from the Department of Defense's
18.	budget.
19.	B. The Federal Railroad Administration will be responsible for
20.	constructing projects across the 48 contiguous States and their
21.	progress will be evaluated each year by the Department of
22.	Transportation to ensure that project expectations are met.
23.	C. The Department of Transportation in conjunction with the Federal
24.	Railroad Administration will invest in opening local employment
25.	opportunities if labor shortages are deemed an obstacle where the
26.	Rail System is being built.
27.	SECTION 4. This legislation will take effect on January 1, 2030.
28.	SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null
29.	and void.

A Bill to Make Super Sunday a National Holiday

- 2. **SECTION 1.** Be it enacted that the super bowl sunday and the day after

 to work or school because of a religious or national festival.

- 8. **SECTION 4.** This legislation will take effect on January 1st 2025.
- SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null
 and void.
