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A Bill to Make Groundhog Day a Federal Holiday

1	BE IT ENACTED BY TH	HE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:
2	SECTION 1.	Groundhog Day (February 2) shall be recognized as a federal

4		until such time as the geopolitical situation in and around that area

8		vessels carrying munitions, regardless of their origin.

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A Bill to Set an Age Limit on the Purchase of Energy Drinks

1	BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:	
2	SECTION 1.	The sale of energy drinks to any persons under the age of 18 is
3		hereby banned.
4	SECTION 2.	Energy drinks are defined as any beverage containing more than
5		150 milligrams of caffeine per liter.
6	SECTION 3.	All states and territories as well as the Federal District are instructed
7		to levy the same criminal penalties on violators of this law as would
8		be applied for the sale of alcohol to minors in that jurisdiction. Any
9		jurisdiction that fails to comply with this directive shall lose 50% of
10		federal highway funding until such time as compliance is reached.
11	SECTION 4.	This legislation shall be overseen by the Food and Drug
12		Administration.
13	SECTION 5.	This legislation shall take effect on January 1, 2025.

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A Bill to Eliminate Past Conviction Queries on Job Applications

1	BE IT ENACTED BY TH	E CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:
2	SECTION 1.	All businesses and organizations will be required to eliminate any
3		inquiries regarding past felony convictions from their job application
4		forms.
5	SECTION 2.	Felony Conviction is defined as being found guilty of a serious crime
6		and serving jail or prison time. A business is an organization of
7		employers that produces, transports, or sells goods and services for
8		profit.
9	SECTION 3.	The Human Resources Department (HR) will oversee the
10		enforcement of this bill.
11	A.	Application forms will exclude past felony convictions in the record.
12	В.	This will implement respect and show equal treatment to any
13		applicants.
14	C.	The HR Department no longer will take into account past
15		convictions.
16	SECTION 4.	This Legislation will take effect January 1, 2025.
17	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and

The Youth Digital Safety Act

1	BE IT ENACTED BY THE	CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:
2	SECTION 1.	All social media companies operating within the United States shall be
3		required to verify the age of their users based on valid legal
4		documentation prior to account creation and use.
5	SECTION 2.	Definitions:
6	A.	"Social media companies" shall be defined as business entities that
7		own or operate online platforms which allow users to create digital
8		profiles, share content, interact with others, and access digital
9		information.
10	В.	"Valid legal documentation" shall be defined as a government-issued
11		document that includes the individual's date of birth and a unique
12		identifying number. Examples include: driver's licenses, passports,
13		Social Security cards, birth certificates, or state-issued identification
14		cards.
15	C.	"Verify" shall be defined as a process through which a social media
16		company authenticates the provided legal documentation to confirm
17		the user's age.
18	SECTION 3.	The Federal Trade Commission (FTC) shall be responsible for
19		overseeing the implementation and enforcement of this legislation.
20		Social media companies found to be in violation of this law shall be
21		subject to fines of up to \$10,000 per unverified active account and may
22		face additional penalties, including suspension of their right to operate
23		within the United States.
24	SECTION 4.	This bill shall take effect twelve months after its passage to allow social
25		media companies time to implement the necessary verification
26		systems.
27	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and

A Resolution to Amend the Constitution to Require a National Popular Vote for Constitutional Amendments

1	RESOLVED,	By two-thirds of the Congress here assembled, that the following article is
2		proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of the United States, which
3		shall be valid to all intents and purposes as part of the Constitution when
4		ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several states within
5		seven years from the date of its submission by the Congress:
6		ARTICLE -
7	SECTIO	N 1: Constitutional amendments proposed by Congress shall be ratified
8		not by the legislatures of three fourths of the several states, but by
9		a vote of two thirds of the people in a singular national popular
10		vote.
11	SECTIO	N 2 . The process for ratification of Constitutional Amendments shall be
12		administered by an independent agency, to be known as the
13		Amendment Ratification Commission. This Commission shall be
14		composed of the Chief Judges of the several Courts of Appeals.
15	SECTIO	N 3. All citizens of the United States who are eligible to vote in federal
16		elections shall be entitled to one in the vote for ratification.
17	SECTIO	N 4. The results of the vote shall be in binding and take effect
18		immediately upon certification by the Amendment Ratification
19		Commission that the amendment has received the required
20		two-thirds majority of votes cast.
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A Resolution to Phase Out Asphalt and Establish Sustainable Alternatives to Combat Urban Heat Island

1	WHEREAS,	The widespread use of asphalt in urban areas is contributing to the
2		formation of heat islands, exacerbating rising temperatures, and negatively
3		impacting the quality of life for city residents; and
4	WHEREAS,	Asphalt, with its heat-absorbing properties, leads to increased
5		temperatures in densely populated areas, contributing to heat related
6		illnesses, increased energy consumption for cooling, and environmental
7		degradation; and
8	WHEREAS,	The detrimental effects of asphalt on urban environments necessitate the
9		development of sustainable alternatives that mitigate the urban heat island
10		effect, reduce energy consumption, and enhance overall livability; now,
11		therefore, be it.
12	RESOLVED,	That the Congress here assembled calls upon the Environmental Protection
13		Agency, in consultation with experts and in collaboration with relevant
14		federal, state, and local agencies, shall develop a plan to phase out asphalt
15		in urban infrastructure and promote sustainable alternatives, considering
16		cost-effectiveness and environmental benefits; and, be it
17	FURTHER RES	OLVED, That annual progress reports and updates on the phase-out of
18		asphalt and the adoption of sustainable alternatives shall be provided to
19		Congress by the Environmental Protection Agency, allowing for ongoing
20		oversight and evaluation of the initiative's effectiveness.

A Bill to Address the National Blood Shortage

4		in which they donate.
5	SECTION 2.	Individuals that donate must meet the standards to safely donate
6		outlined by the Red Cross Administration
7	SECTION 3.	The National Institute of Health will jointly assist the IRS to enforce
8		this bill.
9		A. The tax credit for the first pint donated every year will be
10		granted a 5% federal tax deduction for the current tax year,
11		and will receive an additional 1% tax credit for every pint
12		donated in succession.
13		B. The IRS and National Institute of Health will uphold this
14		legislation until they deem that the country is no longer in a
15		national blood shortage.

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Teacher Diversity and Retention Act

5		socioeconomically diverse, or gender diverse populations. These
6		grants will establish Augustus F. Hawkins Centers of Excellence at

9	SECTION 2.	Grants shall be provided to each state department of education,

8		sanitation, and nutritional assistance.
9	SECTION 3.	The Department of State and the United States Department of the
10		Treasury will oversee the enforcement of this bill.
11	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect on January 1, 2025.
