

# A Bill to Stop Congresspeople from Owning or Trading Upon Stocks (SCOTUS)

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** A. No Member of Congress, officer, employee, or close relative  
3 of a Member of Congress may own an interest in or trade (except  
4 as a divestment) any item listed in Section 2.

5 B. All individuals mentioned in Section 1A will be required to  
6 divest from all items listed in Section 2 once they assume office or  
7 once their relative assumes office.

8 **SECTION 2.** The items referenced in Section 1 shall include stocks, bonds,  
9 commodities, futures, and any other form of security, including  
10 interests in a hedge fund, a derivative, option, or any other  
11 complex investment vehicle.

12 **SECTION 3.** The Securities and Exchanges Commission will oversee the  
13 implementation of this legislation.

14 A. Anybody found in violation shall be subject to a fine of either  
15 \$10,000 or the value of contraband: whichever is greater.

16 B. If the person violating the act is an employee of the federal  
17 government, they will be required to forfeit their pension.

18 **SECTION 4.** This legislation will take effect on January 1, 2026. All laws in  
19 conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

# **A Bill To End Police Chokeholds Nationwide**

**SECTION 1.** The U.S Federal Government should outright ban the use of chokeholds for police officers through all 50 states in the United States

**SECTION 2.** “Chokehold” is defined as a restraining hold in which one person encircles the neck of another in a viselike grip with the arm, usually approaching from behind.

**SECTION 3.** Police have implemented different strategies to do a proper chokehold, such as a carotid restraint and chokehold, however these strategies are frowned upon.

**SECTION 4.** The US Department of Justice will oversee the implementation and oversight of this bill.

**A.** The DOJ will work with Internal Affairs departments in all 50 states to make sure this bill is upheld.

**B.** Failure to comply with this bill will result in a 25% reduction in state funding.

**SECTION 5.** This bill will become effective January of 2026.

**SECTION 6.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void 23

# A Bill to Cut All Funding to F. U. N. (First Use Nuclear) Arms

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2           **SECTION 1.**     The federal government will remove all funding to First  
3           Use Nuclear. All funding removed from First Use Nuclear will be  
4           distributed toward enforcing No First Use Nuclear Arms.

5           **SECTION 2.**     “First Use Nuclear Arms” will be defined as an arsenal of  
6           nuclear bombs that can be used proactively. “No first use” will entail that  
7           the U.S. won’t attack other countries with nuclear arms before first being  
8           attacked with nuclear arms. “Nuclear Arms” will be defined as an  
9           explosive that detonates using nuclear fission or nuclear fusion.

10          **SECTION 3.**     The enforcement of this bill will be overseen by the  
11          Department of Defense.

12          **SECTION 4.**     This legislation will take effect immediately. All laws in  
            conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

# A Bill to Establish Mental Health Programs in Schools

1   **SECTION 1.**   All middle and high schools are now required to have a mental health  
2                   program that adequately addresses and treats the mental illnesses of their  
3                   students.  
4

5   **SECTION 2.** Middle and high schools that receive federal government funding are subject  
6                   under this legislation. Mental illnesses include, but are not limited to,  
7                   anxiety, behavioral, eating, mood, and personality disorders.  
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9   **SECTION 3.**   A school is considered to have fulfilled the requirement of Section 1 when  
10                  they provide treatment to at least 70% of its student body that requests  
11                  the program's services each year and report positive personal satisfaction  
12                  regarding their experience.  
13

14 **SECTION 4.**   The Department of Education and the National Institute of Mental Health  
15                  will oversee this piece of legislation.  
16

17         **A.** If a school so chooses, they may receive help in the form of resources or  
18                 programs from community organizations that have a focus on mental  
19                 health.  
20

21 **SECTION 4.** This bill will become effective in the Fall semester of 2025.  
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23 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void  
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
