A Bill to Prohibit the Transfer of U.S. Prisoners to Foreign Prisons

- Be it enacted by this FFL Congressional Debate here assembled that:
- 2. **SECTION I.** The transfer of United States Citizens convicted under United States law to
- 3. foreign prisons is hereby prohibited. All sentences imposed by U.S. courts shall be served
- within domestic correctional facilities.
- 5. **SECTION II**. For the purposes of this legislation, "Transfer" refers to the relocation of a
- 6. prisoner from a U.S. correctional facility to a facility outside the territorial boundaries of
- the United States. "Foreign prison" denotes any correctional or detention facility located
- 8. outside the United States and not under U.S. jurisdiction.
- **SECTION III.** The Department of Justice shall oversee the enforcement of this legislation.
- 10. A. The DOJ shall review and terminate any existing agreements or treaties that

A Resolution to Amend the Constitution to Remove the Presidential Pardon System

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	RESOLVED,	By two-third	s of the Congress here assembled, that the following article is
2		proposed as	an amendment to the Constitution of the United States, which
3		shall be valid	to all intents and purposes as part of the Constitution when
4		ratified by th	e legislatures of three-fourths of the several states within seven
5		years from th	ne date of its submission by the Congress:
6			ARTICLE
7		SECTION 1:	Article II, Section 2, Clause 1 of the Constitution of the United
8			States is hereby repealed.
9		SECTION 2:	The President of the United States shall no longer have the
10			power to grant Reprieves and Pardons for Offences against the
11			United States within one year from ratification of this article.
12		SECTION 3:	The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by
13			appropriate legislation.

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2	SECTION 1 . The President shall not suspend, terminate, denounce, or withdraw the
3	United States from any international organization or agreement in which the U.S. was
4	a participant or signatory on January 19, 2025, except by and with the advice and
5	consent of the Senate, provided that two-thirds of the Senators present concur, or
6	pursuant to an Act of Congress. Furthermore, USAID is restored to the structure,
7	missions, and personnel other than political appointees it had on January 19, 2025.
8	Neither USAID's structure, missions, nor its personnel (other than political appointees
9	may be changed by the administration without an Act of Congress.
10	SECTION 2 . Personnel levels must be maintained through additional hiring, when
11	necessary. "Political appointees" is defined as personnel directly appointed by the
12	president in jobs which were so designated as of January 19, 2025.
13	SECTION 3. Any current member of the U.S. Congress shall is pre-authorized and
14	shall have standing to sue to maintain U.S. membership in international organizations
15	and agreements denoted in Section 1. The House and Senate Oversight Committees
16	and the Department of Justice shall oversee implementation of this legislation.
17	SECTION 4. This legislation will take effect immediately and is retroactive to
18	January 19, 2025. USAID shall be fully restored within 30 days of passage. All laws in
