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#### A Bill to Ban Child Marriage

## A Bill to Prioritize American Manufacturing Growth and Independence Act

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT: 2 **SECTION 1** The United States will prioritize the growth of domestic manufacturing and 3 reduce dependence on foreign imports, via tax incentives, by increasing 4 investment in domestic manufacturing, technology and training, while 5 using tariffs on imports that undermine either the growth of domestic 6 manufacturing in the United States or fair competition and compliance to 7 labor and environmental standards. **SECTION 2** Incentives meaning tax credits, subsidies, and grants provided to U.S. 8 9 based companies to create manufacturing jobs and invest in 10 domestically based facilities Fair competition refers to treatment practices 11 that don't rely on exploitative labor conditions or disregard to 12 environmental sustainability. **SECTION 3** The U.S. Department of Commerce and Department of Labor will be tasked 14 with overseeing implementation of this Act. Both agencies will be 15 responsible for biannual reports on progress of domestic manufacturing growth and economic impact based on the following proposed incentives, 16 17 restrictions and tariffs A. Providing tax incentives and grants to companies 18 to establish or expand manufacturing facilities and operations in the 19 United States B. Allocation of funds for development of advanced 20 manufacturing technologies along with training programs to utilize 21 untouched work forces C. Imposition of tariffs and restrictions on goods 22 imported that would undermine fair competition or fail to meet labor and 23 environmental standards 24 **SECTION 4** This law will be enacted 90 days after it is passed by Congress, giving time 25 to prepare for any changes. Any current laws or agreements that conflict 26 this will become null and void. 27 **SECTION 5** The provisions stated in this Act will remain in place until the United States

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## A Bill to Increase Federal Protections for National Parks and Endangered Public Lands

1	BE IT ENACT	ED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1	The federal government shall designate an additional 5 million
3		acres of land as protected national parkland by 2030 and prohibit
4		industrial development on these lands.
5	SECTION 2	"Industrial development" includes logging, mining, drilling, and any
6		large-scale commercial construction.
7	SECTION 3	The National Park Service shall oversee enforcement by restricting
8		permits for development and allocating \$10 billion in funding over
9		five years for conservation efforts. Violators will face penalties up to
10		\$10 million per infraction.
11	SECTION 4	This legislation will take effect on July 1, 2026. All laws in conflict with
12		this legislation are hereby declared null and void.



# A Bill to Establish Federal Guidelines for Cryptocurrency Regulation

1	BE IT ENACT	ED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1	The federal government shall regulate cryptocurrency transactions
3		exceeding \$10,000 to prevent fraud and illicit financial activity.
4	SECTION 2	"Cryptocurrency transactions" refer to digital asset exchanges
5		involving Bitcoin, Ethereum, and other decentralized currencies.
6	SECTION 3	The Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) shall oversee
7		enforcement. Cryptocurrency exchanges must register with the SEC
8		and comply with anti-money laundering (AML) and
9		know-your-customer (KYC) regulations. Non-compliance may
10		result in penalties up to \$100 million per violation.
11	SECTION 4	This legislation will take effect in FY 2027. All laws in conflict with this
12		leaislation are hereby declared null and void.
