

INDIVIDUAL EVENTS RULES

AFTER DINNER SPEAKING (J, O) – Pattern A

An original, humorous speech by the student, designed to exhibit sound speech composition, thematic, coherence, direct communicative public speaking skills, and good taste. The speech should not resemble a night club act, an impersonation, or comic dialogue. Audio-visual aids may or may not be used to supplement and reinforced the message. Minimal notes are permitted.

Maximum time limit is 10 minutes

DRAMATIC INTERPRETATION (O) – Pattern A

A cutting that represents one or more characters from a play or plays of literary merit. The focus of this event is on the development of characterization. This material may be drawn from stage, screen, or radio. Use of manuscript is required. Maximum time limit is 10 minutes including introduction.

EXTEMP (N, J, O) – Pattern A

Contestants will be given three topics in the general area of current events, choose one, and have 30 minutes to prepare a speech that is the original work of the student. Maximum time limit for the speech is 7 minutes. Limited notes are permitted. Student will speak in listed order. Postings of topics will be staggered.

PERSUASION (N, O) – Pattern A

An original speech by the student designed to inspire, reinforce, or change the beliefs, attitudes, values or actions of the audience. Audio-visual aids may or may not be used to supplement and reinforce the message. Multiple sources should be used and cited in the development of the speech. Minimal notes are permitted. Maximum time limit is 10 minutes.

POETRY INTERPRETATION (O) – Pattern A

A selection or selections of poetry of literary merit, which may be drawn from more than one source. A primary focus of this event should be on the development of language. Play cuttings and prose works are prohibited. Use of manuscript is required. Maximum time limit is 10 minutes including introduction.

PROGRAM ORAL INTERPRETATION (O) – Pattern A

A program of thematically-linked selections of literary merit, chosen from two or three recognized genres of competitive interpretation (prose/poetry/drama). A primary focus of this event should be on the development of the theme through the use of narrative/story, language, and/or characterization. A substantial portion of the total time must be devoted to each of the genres used in the program. Different genre means the material must appear in separate pieces of literature (e.g., A poem included in a short story that appears only in that short story does not constitute a poetry genre.) Only one selection may be original. Use of manuscript is required. Maximum time limit is 10 minutes including introduction.

COMMUNICATION ANALYSIS (O) – Pattern B

An original speech by the student designed to offer an explanation and/or evaluation of a communication event such as a speech, speaker, movement, poem, poster, film, campaign, etc., through the use of rhetorical principles. Audio-visual aids may or may not be used to supplement and reinforce the message. Manuscripts are permitted. Maximum time limit is 10 minutes.

DRAMATIC DUO (O) – Pattern B

A cutting from one or more texts of literary merit, humorous or serious, involving the portrayal of two or more characters presented by two individuals. The material may be drawn from any genre of literature. This is not an acting event; thus, no costumes, props, lighting, etc, are to be used. Presentation is from the manuscript and the focus should be off-stage and not to each other. Maximum time limit is 10 minutes including introduction. (SPECIAL: A contestant may enter two duos with different partners. This will count as two events in pattern B).

IMPROMPTU (N, J, O) – Pattern B

An impromptu speech, substantive in nature, with topic selections varied by round and by section. Topics will be derived from quotations. Speakers will have a total of 7 minutes for both preparation and speaking. Timing commences with the acceptance of the topics sheet. Limited notes are permitted.

INFORMATIVE (J, O) – Pattern B

An original, factual speech by the student on a realist subject to fulfill the general aim to inform the audience. Audio-visual aids may or may not be used to supplement and reinforce the message. Multiple sources should be used and cited in the development of the speech. Minimal notes are permitted. Maximum time is 10 minutes.

PROSE (N, J, O) – Pattern B

An original or selections of prose material of literary merit, which may be drawn from more than one source. Focus of this event is on the development of the narrative/story. Play cuttings and poetry are prohibited. Use of manuscript is required. Maximum time is 10 minutes including introduction.

PODCASTING (O) – Pattern B (online/asynchronous event)

Drawing inspiration from previous experimental events like “Radio” and “Editorial Commentary,” podcasting is an asynchronous event (so students who are unable to attend the tournament in person can submit entries) where students will have 10 minutes max to stitch together the following three elements and submit a single, *audio-only* file (uploaded to Speechwire):

1. The Trailer - successful podcast trailers should effectively do three things: (1) introduce the topic of the podcast in a compelling way, using their own voice. No props or sound effects (or any extraneous production) other than those made by the speaker’s voice are permitted. Remember: hook but never spoil the show! (2) Speaker should make clear the reason and necessity for their podcast; and (3) provide a “narrative arc” for the season/series.
2. The Guest Interview - participants conduct an original interview with one or more individual(s). It should make clear who is participating and why.
3. Edited Segment - students will then provide a final “clip” of their podcast. It may feature elements from both the trailer and interview. It should be representative of the style and flow of a typical podcast episode from the series.

The elements above can be scripted or improvisational, episodic or serial, fast-paced or a slow-burn. Choices, number of participants, subject matter and ultimate audience is entirely up to the participant(s). The time balance for all three (trailer, interview, edited segment) is also up to the participants. Judges will assess the presentation’s coherence and viability while offering comments on speech fluidity, engagement and talent (many thanks to *Pi Kappa Delta* for some of the language for these event rules and guidelines)
