# A Bill to Expand Student Mental Health services to Improve Well-being

### BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	SECTION 1.	All schools and universities shall provide accessible mental health
2		services, including counseling, therapy, crisis intervention, and social-
3		emotional learning programs, to support student well-being and
4		academic success.
5	SECTION 2.	Accessible mental health services shall be defined as programs provided
6		at no cost to students, including counseling with licensed professionals,
7		peer support programs, and social-emotional learning (SEL) that
8		develops resilience, coping skills, emotional management, and positive
9		relationships.
10	SECTION 3.	The Department of Education (DOE) and the Department of Health and
11		Human Services (HHS) shall oversee implementation and funding,
12		providing up to \$500 million annually to schools that improve student
13		mental health, counseling use, social-emotional skills, attendance, and
14		academic engagement, measured through SEL assessments, utilization
15		data, and student surveys.
16	SECTION 4.	This legislation shall take effect on June 1, 2026. All laws in conflict with
17		this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

# **A Bill to Sanction Qatar**

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:		
2	SECTION 1.	The United States Federal Government shall sanction Qatar by		
3		limiting all forms of trade conducted with Qatar until improvements		
4		are made regarding human rights in Qatar.		
5	SECTION 2.	Improvements include but are not limited to providing safe working		
6		conditions, eliminating gender segregation, and terminating		
7		persecution of the LGBTQ+ community. Sanctions are defined as		
8		economic and trade restrictions placed on a country. Human rights		
9		are rights inherent to all human beings, regardless of race, sex,		
10		nationality, ethnicity, language, religion, or any other protected status		
11		ensuring the protection of these rights.		
12	SECTION 3.	The Department of State (DoS) and the Department of Commerce		
13		(DoC) will oversee enforcement of this legislation.		
14		A. The Department of State will provide reports every six months to		
15		check if requirements are met in order to lift sanctions.		
16	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect on January 1, 2026. All laws in conflict		

with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

# A Bill to Incentivize Universities and Schools to Promote Academic Integrity and All-Rounded Education

### BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	SECTION 1.	The United States shall establish a federal grant program to incentivize
2		universities and K-12 schools to adopt anti-AI cheating safeguards
3		through oral and project-based assessments, and holistic education
4		practices that develop critical thinking, communication, creativity, and
5		collaboration skills.
6	SECTION 2.	A. Anti-AI cheating safeguards shall include oral examinations, in-class
7		project defenses, and interactive student demonstrations of knowledge.
8		B. Holistic education is defined as teaching that integrates academics
9		with arts, athletics, civic engagement, and social-emotional learning.
10		C. Eligible institutions include accredited universities and public K-12
11		schools.
12	SECTION 3.	The Department of Education shall administer this program.
13	\$1 billion in c	competitive federal grants shall be allocated annually as follows:

# A Bill to Incentivize Allied Production of AI Hardware and Protect U.S. AI Innovation from Adversary Imports

### BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	SECTION 1.	The United States shall incentivize allied nations to co-produce AI
2		hardware and data center components while applying strategic tariffs on
3		imports from adversary nations, including China and Russia, to safeguard
4		U.S. AI innovation, domestic infrastructure, and national security.
5	SECTION 2.	Allied nations are countries formally partnered with the U.S. to produce
6		Al hardware and data center infrastructure. Adversary nations are those
7		posing economic, technological, or security risks. AI hardware and data
8		center components include GPUs, servers, storage, and memory essentia
9		for AI computation.
10	SECTION 3.	The Office of the U.S. Trade Representative (USTR), in coordination with
11		the Departments of Commerce, Defense, and Energy, shall oversee
12		funding and enforcement. Up to \$1 billion annually shall support allied
13		production, domestic data center expansion, and tariff implementation.
14		Program effectiveness shall be measured by the percentage of AI
15		hardware sourced from allied nations, reduction of imports from
16		adversary nations, growth in domestic data center capacity, and speed of
17		Al research and deployment in critical sectors.
18	SECTION 4.	This legislation shall take effect on January 1, 2027. All conflicting laws
19		are null and void.

# Syrian Humanitarian Aid and Relief Enhancement Act (SHARE)

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	SECTION 1.	The United States shall allocate \$6 billion to aiding the people of Syria.			
2		A. \$4 billion shall go to the UN for them to allocate to aiding Syria.			
3		B. \$1 billion shall go to NGOs that are authorized by USAID and The			
4		Department of State			
5		C. \$1 billion shall go to enhancing the Syrian Refugee Camps.			
6	SECTION 2.	Humanitarian aid shall consist of food, bottled water, medical equipment,			
7		instructions on how to use said medical equipment, which shall be written			
8		in Arabic, and temporary shelter.			
9	SECTION 3.	The Department of State, and USAID will be in charge of overseeing and			
10		implementing this legislation.			
11		A. The funding for this legislation is to come from the Department of			
12		State.			
13		B. USAID shall use their prior knowledge of reliable NGOs to decide			
14		which NGOs to authorize.			
15	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect immediately upon passage. All laws in			
16		conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

# The Haitian Recovery Act (HR Act)

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:			
2	SECTION 1.	The United States government shall allocate \$1 Billion to support Haiti in			
3		restoring stability, strengthening its national police force, and addressing			
4		urgent humanitarian needs.			
5	SECTION 2.	For the purpose of this bill, the following term shall be defined:			
6		a) Haitian National Police (HNP): The primary law enforcement agency of			
7		Haiti.			
8	SECTION 3.	The Department of State, in coordination with the Department of Defense			
9		and the Department of Treasury, shall oversee the enforcement of this			
10		legislation. The specific enforcement mechanisms shall include:			
11		a) Allocation of Funds: i. \$500 million shall be earmarked for enhancing			
12		and strengthening the capacity of the Haitian National Police, including			
13		training, equipment, and infrastructure. ii. \$300 million shall be allocated			
14		for urgent humanitarian aid, including food, medical supplies, and clean			
15		water. iii. \$200 million shall be reserved for future governance support			
16		and economic development initiatives.			
17		b) Deployment of U.S. Troops: A limited contingent of U.S. troops, not			
18		exceeding 1,000 personnel, shall be deployed to Haiti to assist in training			
19		the HNP and providing logistical support for aid distribution.			
20		c) Monitoring and evaluation: The Department of State shall establish a			
21		monitoring and evaluation framework to assess the effectiveness of the			
22		funds allocated and the progress achieved in stabilizing Haiti.			
23		d) Reporting requirements: The Department of State shall provide			
24		quarterly reports to Congress on the implementation of this bill and the			
25		situation in Haiti, which they will get from the HNP.			
26	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect immediately upon passage.			
27	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void			

# A Bill To Reform Indonesia's Sea-Trade Economy (R.I.S.E)

## BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	<b>SECTION 1</b> .	The United States will establish a free trade agreement with Indonesia
2		and invest 4 billion dollars with the goals of fostering trade with the U.S.,
3		economic development, and protecting already existing trade relations.
4	<b>SECTION 2.</b>	Free trade agreement shall be defined as an agreement which lifts
5		restrictions on the trade and movement of goods, services, and
6		investment.
7	SECTION 3.	The Department of State and Commerce will establish the framework
8		for a deal which will protect and foster American business. The
9		Department of Commerce will additionally allocate investment in
10		Indonesia in sectors that will benefit the local economy and American
11		business interests
12	<b>SECTION 4.</b>	This legislation will be enacted immediately upon passage.
13	SECTION 5	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void

# A Bill to Improve Saudi Humane Intervention Endeavors and Logistics Domestically (S.H.I.E.L.D. ACT)

## BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1.	SECTION 1.	The Uni	ted States shall hereby formally initiate negotiations for the
2.		formatio	n of a defense pact with Saudi Arabia, whereas the specificities
3.		of the pa	ct itself shall be set through the aforementioned future
4.		negotiati	on.
5.	SECTION 2.	Α.	A defense pact shall be defined as a mutually agreed-upon set of
6.			conditions pertaining to the reciprocal military defense of both
7.			involved nations.
8.		В.	It shall be clearly established in any and all negotiations that the
9.			premise of nuclear mutually assured destruction will not be a
10.			factor in any possible defense pact.
11.		C.	In order to initiate the negotiation procedure, the Saudi Arabian
12.			Ministry of Defense must first acknowledge and accept that the
13.			The United States reserves the right to withdraw from the
14.			negotiation of the defense pact at any time without retaliation, or
15.			else risk political and economic isolation.
16.	SECTION 3.	The US I	Department of State in conjunction with the US Ambassador to
17.		Saudi Ar	abia shall be responsible for the implementation and oversight of
18.		this bill.	
19.	SECTION 4.	This legi	slation shall be implemented immediately upon passage.

# A Bill to Place Limits on the Strategic Petroleum Reserve

### BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

- 1. **SECTION 1.** Withdrawals from the Strategic Petroleum Reserve shall now be limited.
- 2. A. Oil may not be removed from the Strategic Petroleum Reserve for the
- 3. purpose of lowering consumer gas prices.
- 6. B. Withdrawals from the Strategic Petroleum Reserve will only be allowed in
- 7. the event of supply disruption of oil imports.
- 8. **SECTION 2.** Supply disruption of oil imports will be defined as an event in which U.S.
- 9. States or the Federal government declares a state of emergency or
- 10. previously existent foreign imports are disrupted
- 11. **SECTION 3.** The Department of Energy will oversee this legislation and ensure that the
- 12. proper requirements are met before oil is taken from the Strategic
- 13. Petroleum Reserve.
- 14. **SECTION 4.** This legislation will take effect on January 1, 2026.
- 15. **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

# A Bill to Implement Sectoral Bargaining in Favor of a Federal Minimum Wage

1	BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:				
2	SECTION 1.	A federal minimum wage, as established by the Fair Labor Standards Act,			
3		shall be ab	polished and instead sectoral bargaining shall be implemented.		
4		All other p	provisions of the Fair Labor Standards Act shall be preserved,		
5		and sector	ral bargaining codified into federal law via amendment to the		
6		National L	abor Relations Act.		
7	SECTION 2.	Sectoral b	argaining shall be defined as the form of collective bargaining		
8		within wh	ich unions of employees negotiate wages and benefits with		
9		employers	s to set company and industry wide labor standards.		
10	SECTION 3.	The Natio	The National Labor Relations Board, serving as an independent		
11		governme	ntal agency already overseeing the enforcement of the		
12		National L	abor Relations Act, shall be responsible for the implementation		
13		and enfor	cement of this legislation.		
14		A.	An additional \$150 billion dollars shall be allocated to the		
15			NLRB annually for the enforcement of standards set by		
16			sectoral bargaining.		
17		В.	Companies in violation of labor standards set by sectoral		
18			bargaining shall be subject to monetary fines imposed on		
19			them by the NLRB using its existing enforcement mechanisms		
20			over corporations.		
21	SECTION 4.	This legisla	ation will take effect on October 1st, 2026 in line with the		
22		beginning	of the 2026 fiscal year. All laws in conflict with this legislation		
23		are hereby	y declared null and void.
