1	BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:			
2		SECTION 1.	The United States will invest \$40 million in election	
3		cybersecurity	infrastructure to protect against the involvement of foreign	
4		actors.		
5		SECTION 2.	Election cybersecurity infrastructure shall be defined as,	
6		but is not limit	ted to, any information technology (IT) system used to	
7		manage elections or store data, polling facilities, detect generative Al,		
8		social media misinformation, or any other associated IT systems used for		
9		elections.		
10		SECTION 3.	The Department of Homeland Security shall oversee the	
11		implementation	on of this legislation.	
12		A. An indepe	ndent committee shall develop guidelines on election	
13		cybersecu	rity, enforcing standards for operating and updating	
14		election sy	stems, generative AI, and media guidelines to prevent	
15		misinform	ation.	
16		B. The adviso	ory shall award cybersecurity and modernization grants to	
27		underfund	ded agencies. Any state that fails to maintain standards	
28		establishe	d by the committee will lose 10% of funding each year.	
		SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect immediately upon action.	
		SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared	
		null and void.

The Liberation for All in Neighborhood Domiciles Act (L.A.N.D. Act)

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	SECTION 1.	Homeowners Association groups will no longer be permitted to limit	
2		demonstrations of free speech	
3	SECTION 2.	A. "Homeowners Association groups" refers to organizations that manage a	
4		planned unit development (such as a suburban housing complex) or a	
5		condominium project.	
6		B. "Free speech" refers to any example of free speech upheld by Supreme	
7		Court precedent. This includes but is not limited to the following: display of	
8		flags, projection of lights onto one's property, seasonal decorations.	
9		C. "Limitations" refers to the contractual hindering of one's ability to perform	
10		an action protected by free speech via fines or expulsion.	
11	SECTION 3.	The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development shall oversee the	
12		enforcement of this policy.	
13		A. HOA organizations in violation failing to comply with the above provisions	
14		shall be subject to fines of \$50,000 for the first infraction, doubling for each	
15		subsequent infraction	
16	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect on January 1, 2027.	
17	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void
