A Bill to Abolish Legacy Admissions in Colleges to Promote Merit-Based Access

1	BE IT ENACT	FED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	All public and private higher education institutions in the United States shall
3		be prohibited from considering alumni status, family connections, or legacy
4		affiliations in their admissions processes. College admissions shall be based
5		solely on academic merit, extracurricular achievement, and other neutral
6		criteria.
7	SECTION 2.	A . Legacy admissions shall be defined as any practice by which an applicant's
8		family relationship with alumni, trustees, or donors influences admission
9		decisions.
LO		B. Merit-based criteria shall be defined as academic performance,
l1		standardized test scores, extracurricular involvement, personal statements,

13	SECTION 3.	The Department of Education shall oversee compliance, requiring annual

15		A. Colleges found in violation shall be subject to federal fines and potential
16		loss of federal funding, scaled proportionally to the number of admissions

	SECTION 4.	This legislation shall take effect on January 1, 2026. All laws, policies, or

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A Bill to Ban Dopamine Looping on Social Media

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	SECTION 1.	The use of social media in a short form setting depends on dopamine
2		looping. Dopamine looping shall be prohibited within the United States in
3		order to prevent reduced attention spans, excessive distractions, and
4		addictions.
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- 5 **SECTION 2.** For the purposes of this legislation, dopamine looping content is the ability to continuously scroll without picking your content. Applications shall include, but are not limited to, Tik Tok (being the primary example), Instagram, Snapchat, Twitter, Youtube, ETC.
- A. Reformed dopamine looping means removing and banning the ability to
 continuously scroll with short form content from social media platforms.
 - B. This will in no way conflict with or remove content from the platforms.
 - C. EX: Youtube shorts will be prohibited, but not the Youtube application.
 - SECTION 3. The Federal Trade Commission (FTC) and the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) shall jointly oversee enforcement of this legislation. These agencies shall prohibit the ability of dopamine looping content controlled by: ByteDance Ltd, Meta Platforms Inc, Google, and other companies that provide short form content.
 - **SECTION 4.** This legislation will take effect on January 1st, 2027. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Require States Receiving Federal Education Funding to Mandate CPR Training as a High School Graduation Requirement

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

SECTION 1. For all school districts receiving federal funding under the 1 Elementary and Secondary Education Act, all high school students will be 2 required to become certified in CPR, as a graduation requirement to 3 receive an official High School Diploma provided by the state or district 4 Board of Education. 5 SECTION 2. Becoming CPR certified is defined as a credential that 6 qualifies the holder to perform a life-saving procedure on someone who 7 cannot breathe on their own due to a near-drowning incident, suffocation 8 or a cardiac event. 9 CPR is defined as an emergency procedure used during 10 cardiac or respiratory arrest that involves chest compressions, to preserve 11 brain function and maintain circulation until spontaneous breathing and 12 heartbeat can be restored. 13 SECTION 3. The Department of Education will be in charge of approving 14 eligible courses, developing proper guidelines for school districts to follow, 15 and maintaining information that ensures the students are complying with 16 this bill. The local school districts will ensure that students have access to 17 these courses, integrating these lessons within physical education and 18 health classes. 19 SECTION 4. The students that will be exempt from this bill include those who are 20 religiously excused and students with any medical issue preventing them 21 from taking this course. 22 23 SECTION 5. This legislation will take effect at the beginning of the 26-27 school year for all students. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Enhance National Defense in the Arctic

3		development new technologies to improve national defense in the Arctic
4	SECTION 2.	"Defense strategies and technologies" are defined as the technology,
5		weaponry, and government organizations that focus on increasing the
6		ability to be able to function in an Arctic environment.

12		B. The US military will increase engagement with other Arctic nations in

15	SECTION 5.	This legislation will take effect immediately after passage. All laws in
16		conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Include All Americans in the Military Draft

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

- able-bodied citizens above the age of 18, regardless of gender, to register for the military draft. All able-bodied citizens between the ages of 18 to 44 will be eligible for conscription into the military if necessary, prioritizing those between the ages of 18 and 25.
- The Selective Service System will be in charge of the implementation of this legislation and will be allocated an extra \$5 million for the next fiscal year to account for increased registration management. Those who newly qualify for the draft under this legislation will have until January 1st, 2027, to register for the draft.
- **SECTION 3.** This legislation will be implemented at the start of Fiscal Year 2026.
- **SECTION 4.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

The Revitalizing Energy through Advancing Clean Technologies (R.E.A.C.T.) Act

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	SECTION 1.	The United States government shall transfer subsidies currently towards
2		fossil fuels to the production of green technology and expansion thereof
3		gradually over the course of ten years. Additionally, the federal government
4		shall allocate \$3 billion a year in grants to fund investments and innovations
5		in green technology with the goal of developing more affordable, efficient
6		technology.
7	SECTION 2.	A. Subsidies refer to government assistance or investments into a specific
8		industry to lower the costs of production or stimulate a greater magnitude of
9		output.
10		B. Green energy refers to any renewable energy source that has the lowest
11		carbon footprint, such as solar power, wind power, and hydro power. Fossil
12		fuel refers to any nonrenewable source extracted from Earth and burned for
13		energy, such as coal, gas, and oil.
14		C. Subsidies will be transferred at a rate of ten-percent the original amount
15		of fossil fuel subsidies per year.
16	SECTION 3.	A. The Department of Energy (DOE) shall be the lead agency in overseeing
17		the research and innovation, and shall also manage the distribution of
18		grants.
19		B. The Department of the Treasury shall be the lead agency in overseeing
20		gradual transfer of subsidies away from fossil fuel sources.
21	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect on FY 2026. All laws in conflict with this
22		legislation are hereby declared null and void.

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A Bill to Increase Prisoner Rehabilitation Infrastructure to Improve our Justice System

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	SECTION 1.	\$10 billion will be allocated from the Department of Justice to support
2		underfunded rehabilitation programs across all private and public prisons
3		that house federal prisoners.
4	SECTION 2.	A. Rehabilitation programs will be defined as programs intended to reduce
5		recidivism and improve social, mental, and educational opportunities
6		among prisoners.
7		B. Funding will go towards existing rehabilitation programs, including but
8		not limited to Reasoning and Rehabilitation (R&R), Thinking for a Change
9		(T4C), and Moral Reconation Therapy (MRT).
10	SECTION 3.	The Department of Justice will oversee implementation of this legislation.
11		A. The DOJ's Office of the Inspector General will conduct quarterly
12		inspections each year regarding outcomes of each rehabilitation
13		program, to be compiled into a report for public release.
14	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect at the beginning of Fiscal Year 2026.
