#### A Bill to Provide a Universal Basic Income to All Americans

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THIS CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2 **SECTION 1**. All US citizens who provide documentation to the government will
- 3 receive a \$1,000 monthly universal basic income payment.
- 4 **SECTION 2**. Every American aged 21 and older will receive a universal basic
- 5 income that can be used at their discretion, regardless of current or future
- 6 employment status.
- 7 **SECTION 3**. The Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) will
- 8 implement this program, with assistance from the Social Security Administration.
- 9 The bill will be funded by an adjustment of the taxation system: a) the Social
- Security tax rate shall be increased to 10%, and b) the corporate tax rate shall be
- 11 raised to 30%.
- 12 **SECTION 4**. This legislation will take effect January 1st, 2027.
- 13 **SECTION 5**. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby null and void.

#### A Bill to Establish a National Volunteer Service Requirement

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THIS CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2 **SECTION 1**. All public high school students shall be required to complete a
- 3 minimum of 50 hours of verified volunteer service as a graduation requirement.
- 4 **SECTION 2**. Volunteer service shall be defined as unpaid service performed by a
- 5 student through a nonprofit organization, public agency, or civic initiative that
- 6 benefits the community. Qualifying service excludes service performed
- 7 exclusively for the internal benefit of religious institutions or faith-based programs
- 8 limited to members of one faith community.
- 9 **SECTION 3**. The Department of Education shall oversee implementation
- 10 including designating Volunteer Hours Coordinators within districts and
- 11 standardizing verification forms. Exemptions or accommodations may be granted
- for students with documented disabilities or hardships.
- 13 **SECTION 4**. This policy shall take effect on January 1, 2027.
- 14 **SECTION 5**. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby null and void.

#### A Resolution to Reduce the Sale of Highly Caffeinated Drinks

- 1 **WHEREAS**, Almost two billion energy drinks were sold in the United States in
- 2 2024 leading to the fastest growth in soft drinks; and
- WHEREAS, It is estimated that 30-50% of individuals consume energy drinks on
- 4 a daily basis; and
- 5 **WHEREAS**, Almost one-third of adolescents ages 12-17 drink energy drinks
- 6 regularly; and
- 7 WHEREAS. Adolescents who consume excessive amounts of caffeine can suffer
- 8 from increased heart rate and blood pressure which can result in damaged blood
- 9 vessels; and
- 10 **WHEREAS**, Young adults who consume more than 100 mg of caffeine in a single
- drink can have increased anxiety or depression which may have a negative
- impact on their educational performance; now, therefore, be it
- 13 **RESOLVED**, That the Congress here assembled recommend that
- drinks with over 80 mg of caffeine will not be sold to persons under the age of 17.

# A Resolution to Eliminate Solar Panels on Rural Agricultural Land by Eliminating Subsidies

- 1 **WHEREAS**, Solar panels are occupying and destroying productive farmland,
- 2 preventing and denying future farmers and ranchers the ability to use this land to
- 3 its fullest intended extent; and
- 4 WHEREAS, Fueled by attractive subsidies that benefit solar farm industries, the
- 5 installation and use of solar panels on rural farmland has increased nearly 50%
- 6 nationwide, greatly impacting the agricultural industry; and
- WHEREAS, By 2050, the use of approximately 10.5 million acres of farmland in
- 8 the United States will be dedicated to solar energy, which can and will be
- 9 devastating to agricultural industries across the nation; now, therefore, be it
- 10 **RESOLVED**, That the Congress here assembled recommend eliminating further
- subsidies to solar energy on agricultural land, as well as to stop federal funding
- to these solar farms.

## A Bill to Split Electoral Vote Between Presidential Candidates Based on the Popular Vote of Each State

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THIS CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2 **SECTION 1**. To ensure that all votes count and that the President Elect is more
- accurately based on the popular vote of the people of the United States, electoral
- 4 votes in each state shall now be split between presidential candidates on the
- 5 ballot based on the percentage of popular votes received by each candidate in
- 6 each state.
- 7 **SECTION 2**. For the purpose of this bill: a) Electoral Votes are the votes cast by
- 8 appointed electors in the Electoral College, and b) Popular Votes are the votes
- 9 for a U.S. Presidential candidate made by the qualified voters, as opposed to that
- 10 made by the Electoral College.
- 11 **SECTION 3**. Each state's government will oversee the changes to the voting
- 12 system in their particular state.
- 13 **SECTION 4**. This law will go into effect January 1, 2028
- 14 **SECTION 5**. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby null and void.

## A Bill to Authorize the Use of Military Force Against Russia for Its Invasion of Ukraine

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THIS CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2 **SECTION 1.** The President is authorized to use all necessary and appropriate
- 3 military force against Russian Forces for their illegal invasion of Ukraine.
- 4 **SECTION 2.** For the purposes of this bill, Russian Forces are defined as soldiers,
- 5 equipment and assets of the Russian military being used to invade the country of
- 6 Ukraine.
- 7 **SECTION 3.** The President of the United States and the Department of Defense
- 8 shall enforce this bill.
- 9 **SECTION 4.** This bill will go into effect immediately.
- 10 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby null and void.
