

A Bill to Repeal the One Big Beautiful Bill to Restore Fiscal and Social Stability

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1 **SECTION 1.** The Omnibus Prosperity and Reconciliation Act of 2025 (Public Law
2 119-21), also known as the OBBBA, is hereby repealed in its entirety. All
3 provisions, amendments, and appropriations established by this Act are
4 rescinded.

5 **SECTION 2.** "Reconciliation Provisions" shall refer to the budgetary changes made
6 under the 2025 reconciliation process that modified the Internal Revenue
7 Code of 1986, the Social Security Act, and the Immigration and Nationality
8 Act.

9 **SECTION 3.** The Department of the Treasury, the Department of Agriculture (USDA),
10 and the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) shall oversee the
11 reversion of policies to their status as of July 3, 2025.

12 The heads of each Department shall submit a Transition Plan to Congress
13 within 90 days of passage to ensure a reversion of services

14 A. The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) shall adjust tax brackets, standard deductions,
15 and credits (including the Child Tax Credit and SALT caps) to pre-OBBBA levels for
16 the next filing season.

17 B. Any unspent funds appropriated for border enforcement or detention facilities
18 under P.L. 119-21 shall be returned to the General Fund of the Treasury, except
19 those funds already obligated to contracts where the cost of termination exceeds
20 the cost of completion.

21 C. The USDA shall immediately suspend the expanded work requirements for the
22 Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) implemented by this Act.

23

24 **SECTION 4.** The GAO shall report to Congress every 6 months on the cost savings
25 achieved by this repeal.

26 **SECTION 5.** This legislation will take effect on January 1st, 2027. All laws in conflict with
27 this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

The Cuban Ascension Policy Act (C.A.P. Act)

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1 **SECTION 1.** The United States government shall lift economic sanctions on the country of Cuba
2 by repealing the *Helms-Burton Act*, *Cuban Assets Control Regulations*, and the
3 *Cuban Democracy Act*. Furthermore, the United States Government shall engage
4 in foreign relations with the country of Cuba to achieve and maintain the goal of
5 open trade and borders between one another.

6 **SECTION 2.** The definitions for this act are as follows:

7 A. The Cuban Assets Control Regulations shall be abbreviated if necessary to
8 “The CACR.”

9 B. The Office of the United States Trade Representative shall be abbreviated
10 if necessary to “The USTR.”

11 **SECTION 3.** The United States Congress shall oversee the repealing of the Helms-Burton Act,
12 Cuban Assets Control Regulations, and the Cuban Democracy Act. The USTR
13 shall be tasked with foreign relations with Cuba to achieve the goals stated in
14 Section 1.

15 **SECTION 4.** This act shall go into effect 90 days after passage.

16 **SECTION 5.** All laws and EOs in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Give Puerto Rico Electoral Votes

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

Section 1. Whereas Puerto Rico hosts over 3 million citizens who are constituents of the United States of America, who are all deserving of recognition.

Section 2. Be it resolved that Puerto Rico shall appoint in such manner as the Congress may direct:

A number of electors of President and Vice President equal to the whole number of Senators and Representatives in Congress to which Puerto Rico would be entitled if it were a State, but in no event more than the least populous State; they shall be in addition to those appointed by the States, but they shall be considered, for the purposes of the election of President and Vice President, to be electors appointed by a State; and they shall meet in Puerto Rico and perform such duties as provided by the twelfth article of amendment.

Section 3. The Congress shall have the power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

Section 4. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Expand Public Transportation Infrastructure to combat rampant road congestion and give power back to the American people

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** The United States will invest in improving our railway systems on a
3 national level. The United States will establish a local transportation
4 rail system within major Metropolitan areas. Additionally, the United
5 States will establish a national super railway between our major
6 cities.

7 **SECTION 2.**

9 **SECTION 4.** This legislation will take effect on Feb 28th, 2026. All laws in conflict
10 with this legislation and previously establish contracts with private
11 investors are hereby declared null and void

5 **WHEREAS,** It is the stated goal of the current administration to combat problems

6 harming the health of United States Citizens; now, therefore, be it

7 **RESOLVED,** That the Congress here assembled shall create a Congressional

8 Committee to present rational legislation to understand and regulate

9 the Telehealth industry.

Supplemental Legislation

A Bill to Rebuild Rural Hospitals

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** The federal government shall allocate \$30 billion over five fiscal years to
3 direct grants to reopen, expand, or modernize hospitals and healthcare
4 clinics in rural and medically underserved areas of the United States.

5 **SECTION 2.** “Rural” shall be defined as any county or census tract with a population of
6 50,000 or fewer residents, as determined by the most recent U.S. Census.
7 “Medically underserved area” refers to any region designated by the
8 Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) as lacking sufficient
9 primary care, hospital, or emergency medical facilities.

10 **SECTION 3.** The Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), in coordination
11 with the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS), shall oversee
12 the implementation of this program.

13 A. HHS will create a competitive grant application system for eligible
14 hospitals and healthcare providers.

15 B. CMS will monitor compliance and publish annual reports on access
16 and quality improvements in funded regions.

17 C. No less than 20% of total funding shall be reserved for emergency and
18 maternity care units in regions experiencing hospital closures.

19 **SECTION 4.** This legislation will take effect on July 1, 2026.

20 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Phase out Forever Chemicals in Food

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** The United States shall allocate 5 billion dollars to phase out PFAS over a
3 10 year period. This congress will increase access to purified water as well
4 as regulate food packaging and quality through mandating that all water
5 utilities, food manufacturers, and food retail enterprises test and report
6 PFAS concentration with the goal of reducing U.S PFAS exposure to 4.4
7 nanograms per kilogram of body weight per week.

8 **SECTION 2.** “PFAS” shall be defined as perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances
9 that are used in consumer products and industrial processes. “Water
10 utilities” are public sector facilities that provide water supply services
11 and/or wastewater and sanitation services. “Food manufacturers” shall
12 refer to companies that make or process food products that are sold in
13 establishments. “Food retail enterprises” shall include restaurants, fast
14 food outlets, and pubs, offering any processed and prepared food or drink
15 directly to customers.

16 **SECTION 3.** The Food and Drug Administration and Environmental Protection Agency
17 will work in conjunction with State Public Utility Commissions to oversee
18 the enforcement of this legislation.

19 A. The Food and Drug Administration will supervise the gradual increase
20 in PFAS regulation over the 10 year project.

21 B. Named institution or enterprise categories that fail to meet or
22 cooperate with standards will face a 0.2% fine based on their annual
23 revenue.

24 **SECTION 4.** This legislation will take effect on July 1, 2026.

25 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Ban Trading of Stocks by Members of Congress

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** The Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) will require all elected members of
3 Congress to secure any privately owned tradable assets in a blind trust. Elected members of
4 Congress will be ineligible to actively participate in any form of stock trading for the
5 duration of their term.

6 **SECTION 2.** Stock trading will be defined as any exchange of shares of any company through the stock
7 market. A blind trust is defined as a financial arrangement in which a person in public office
8 gives the administration of private business interests to an independent trust to prevent a
9 conflict of interest.

10 **SECTION 3.** The Financial Industry Regulatory Authority, with oversight from the Securities and
11 Exchange Commission, will oversee enforcement of this bill.

12 **SECTION 4.** This bill will be implemented 90 days after passing.

13 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Eliminate Squatter Laws

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** The legal recognition of squatters' rights shall be abolished across all states. Additionally,
3 federal funding shall be allocated to create or reform homeless shelters to provide
4 adequate housing alternatives.

5 **SECTION 2.** A. "Squatter rights" shall be defined as any claim to the property by individuals occupying
6 it without ownership or a formal lease agreement.

7 B. "Homeless shelters" shall be defined as government-funded facilities offering
8 temporary housing, rehabilitation programs, and job assistance to individuals
9 experiencing homelessness.

10 **SECTION 3.** The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) shall be responsible for
11 overseeing the implementation and enforcement of this policy.

12 A. \$1 billion will be given to HUD to provide federal grants to state and local governments
13 to expand or build homeless shelters and implement support services, including
14 housing alternatives, rehabilitation, and job training programs.

15 B. Squatters arrested or caught by law enforcement will be subject to 100 hours of
16 community service and will be released in homeless shelters with no criminal record
17 related to squatting.

18 **SECTION 4.** This legislation will take effect on July 1, 2026.

19 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Resolution to Amend the Constitution to Create Term Limits for Congressional Members

RESOLVED, By two-thirds of the Congress here assembled, that the following article is proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of the United States, which shall be valid to all intents and purposes as part of the Constitution when ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several states within seven years from the date of its submission by the Congress:

ARTICLE --

SECTION 1. The United States Federal government shall no longer permit term lengths longer than three terms for individuals in the House of Representatives. This means that the maximum amount of time that a representative can occupy one of that state's house seats shall not exceed six years.

SECTION 2. The United States Federal government shall no longer permit term lengths longer than one term for individuals in the Senate. This means that the maximum amount of time that a senator can occupy one of that state's senate seats shall not exceed more than six years.

SECTION 3. The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

A Bill to Abolish Plea Bargains

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** The practice of plea bargaining in criminal cases is hereby abolished.

3 **SECTION 2.** Plea bargaining shall be defined as an arrangement between a prosecutor and a defendant
4 whereby the defendant pleads guilty to a lesser charge in exchange for a more lenient
5 sentence.

6 **SECTION 3.** The Department of Justice will oversee the implementation of this bill.

7 **SECTION 4.** This Bill will go into effect on January 1, 2028.

8 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation shall hereby be declared null and void.

A Bill to End US Membership in the United Nations

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** This bill shall repeal the United Nations Participation Act of 1945, and the United Nations
3 Headquarters Agreement Act.

4 **SECTION 2.** The President shall terminate all membership by the United States in the United Nations,
5 and in any organization, specialized agency, commission, treaty, convention or other
6 formally affiliated body of the United Nations.

7 A. The United States Mission to the United Nations is closed. Any remaining functions of
8 such office shall not be carried out.

9 B. The United Nations may not occupy or use any property or facility of the United States
10 government, unless further legislation is passed that allows this.

11 **SECTION 3.** This bill shall take effect on the date that is one year after the date of its enactment.

12 **SECTION 4.** The implementation shall be overseen by the Foreign Relations Committee and the
13 Secretary of State.

14 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
